# About the survey

The survey we are asking you to take part in is a national survey of everyone who has recently qualified from any university or HE college in the UK. The information you provide will also be very useful to us at university/college to advise our current students about the opportunities that might be available to them.

Of those who obtained qualifications across the UK in **2009/10**, **78.9%** responded to the survey. Of these, **62.2%** reported that they were working and a further **9.2%** were working and studying. **13.4%** were undertaking further study only. **7.1%** of leavers were assumed to be unemployed.
